#### SECONDARY STUDENT LEADERSHIP

We are excited to report on our recent initiative to expand student leadership roles, previously fulfilled mainly by Year 11 prefects. Our goal was to broaden participation and offer specific leadership training and development opportunities. The new roles aim to empower students to take on responsibilities, develop leadership skills, and positively contribute to our school community. By involving more students in leadership and offering skill development opportunities, we are equipping them with the tools needed to succeed academically and in their future endeavours. This shift from prefects to inclusive participation underscores our belief in the capacity of all students to lead, and promotes the concept of servant leadership. Initially, leadership applications were open to Year 10 students, with future plans to extend this opportunity to Years 7 through 9. The application process mirrored real-life experiences, including an application form, reference, short-listing, and interview process. This approach aims not only to encourage leadership but also to teach valuable life skills.

This term, we implemented a significant change: all Year 10 students were required to fulfil certain duties to aid the smooth running of our school, a responsibility that will continue into Year 11. In return, students earn the privilege of entering the school building at 8:30am instead of 8:50am during Year 11, although this privilege can be revoked if responsibilities are not met. This initiative seeks to foster a more inclusive and practical approach to student leadership, benefiting our entire school community.

#### **EARLY BIRDS BREAKFAST CLUB**

students come to school without eating breakfast. To address this, the students created and planned an Early Birds Breakfast Club.

They surveyed their peers to gauge interest, need, and breakfast preferences, then budgeted and organised the provision. Although a trial day was scheduled, there was not enough take-up to go ahead. Instead, the students conducted a quick straw poll and found that older students are less likely to eat breakfast. New strategies will be looked at to encourage students to start their day with a nutritious meal, helping them feel satisfied and energetic.

Our Year 9 students have shown great initiative, planning and problemsolving skills. We will keep you updated on progress and upcoming initiatives to promote healthy breakfast habits among our students.

#### **ISA COMPETITIONS**

#### **ISA REGIONAL ATHLETICS**

On Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> May we took two minibuses to Bedford International Athletics stadium for the ISA Regional (London North) athletics championships. With events for pupils from Year 4 through to Year 11, it was a busy day, with hundreds of competitors from many different schools vying to win their event and thus qualify for the national champs. Our team of 30 pupils did us proud, with some fantastic personal best



performances throughout the day. Our team won 9 gold medals across 7 different athletes, who all made it through to Birmingham, along with 4 others who made it through to either be in relay teams or as a second runner in the 800m. Our gold medallists were: Arit (Y6 80m), Matthew (Y7 200m), Jeremy (Y7 Shot & Discus), Tof (Y7 Shot), Paa (Y8/9 Triple Jump), Tabitha (Y10/11 Shot & Discus) and Gracelynne (Y10/11 200m). Well done to everyone who competed and represented our school so well and thank you to Mrs Norling, Mr Jones and Mr Reeves for accompanying the team.



#### **ISA NATIONAL CHAMPS**

What a smart venue Alexander Stadium has become, following its re-fit ahead of the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham in 2022. 11 of our pupils had qualified from the ISA regional champs in Bedford and headed to the Midlands to represent our London North region at the National champs, accompanied by Mr Reeves. The team performed really well, with some great throws, jumps and sprints. Our pupils won 3 medals overall, which included an impressive Bronze medal for Paa in the Triple Jump, having only recently started competing in the event. Matthew followed up his success at the district and county champs by taking home yet another

sprint gold, his fourth of the summer, following up his win two years ago in the Y5 75m. Final mention on this occasion must go to Gracelynne, who had made it to Bedford back in May just in time for the 200m, having sat a GCSE exam that morning! Having got her exams out of the way, Gracelynne won a bronze in Birmingham,



and has now won medals at every national champs from Year 6 to this year! She has been such a consistent performer over the years at 100m & 200m at district & county champs, as well as the ISA competitions. Thank you Gracelynne for being an inspiration to our younger pupils with your graceful sprinting and for representing our school so well over the years.

#### ISA MULTI-SKILLS FESTIVAL

Our Year 2 class, accompanied by Mr & Mrs Reeves and Mrs Salami, took part in the inaugural ISA London North multiskills sports festival on 11<sup>th</sup> June. They had a brilliant day, helped by it being nowhere near as hot as the year before! They progressed through a carousel of sporting challenges and games, all culminating in a series of sprint races on the surrounding track and them all receiving a medal at the end. Our team got great sportsmanship scores. Well done to the whole Year 2 class for representing our school with such joy and determination.





#### **ISA 5-A-SIDE FOOTBALL**

Mr Reeves and Mr Lythe took a team of footballers from Years 1 & 2 to Barnet Powerleague on 16<sup>th</sup> May for a 5-a-side tournament against other ISA London North schools. It was great fun as we played against 6 other teams in the course of the day, getting the odd win and scoring some great goals. The players really developed as the day went on and had a great time. We'll definitely be back for more!

#### AND ATHLETICS ACHIEVEMENTS

#### **HERTS COUNTY CHAMPS**

Four of our most talented athletes took to the track for the Herts Schools County Champs on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> June at Jarman Park, Hemel Hempstead. Chloe & Asia (Y9) competed in the very competitive U15 girls' 100m, with several heats meaning qualification for the final was very tough. Chloe wasn't well on the day but Asia ran really well, making it through to the final and coming 4<sup>th</sup> with a fantastic run. We also had two Y7 boys competing in what's called the 'pre-junior' age group. Jeremy competed in throwing events, with Matthew testing his speed in the 100m sprint. He reached the final and scorched to victory with a brilliant run, making him our 4<sup>th</sup> ever county champion. Well done Matthew, a great achievement.

#### **DISTRICT CHAMPS**

Another busy day of athletics at Woodside Stadium, Watford, on Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> June, saw 30 of our Secondary pupils competing against the best from the large Secondary schools in St Albans & Harpenden. This is always a tough, but inspiring, competition and this year was no different, with several PBs for our pupils as they gave it their all. There were lots of top 8 finishes and four medals won: Chloe (Silver in the Y9 100m), Asia (Bronze in the Y9 200m) and Matthew (Gold in the Y7 100m and Silver in the Y7 Long Jump). Well done to all who took part.



#### **SCHOOL SPORTS DAY**

Our annual inter-house sports day took place on Friday 21<sup>st</sup> June at Stockwood Park in Luton. We were blessed with a dry day and a great couple of hours of athletics. Campbell looked to be coming out on top, with lots of strong individual performances, leading them to 2<sup>nd</sup> place in both Primary & Secondary. Wigglesworth were in front once the Y5/6 scores were totted up, but overall it was the Bunyan team that took home the golden shoe trophy, due to being better at filling all the events

and having a storming performance from their Y9/10 boys, who scored an amazing 91 pts and smashed the 4x100m relay record by 1.3 secs! The Bunyan team finished on 362, just 4 ahead of Campbell on 358. Another really close finish, well done to all!

A group of Year 10 students recently organised and ran a full day of workshops for the entire Secondary school titled "Grace and Growth". The day began with student-led worship featuring drums and an electric guitar, and concluded with small, student-led discussion groups. Two guest speakers also added testimonies and input about Mission.

The Year 2s enjoyed drawing their friend's portraits. Each child had a go at drawing their friend by looking closely at the features on their friend's face.
















The Year 2s expressed their thankful hearts for all the blessings they enjoy. They wrote each blessing on some fruit to show how grateful they are to the LORD.










#### **ENGLISH LANGUAGE FOCUS**
